§ 5(1)(b)	Rules for the implementation of the student's obligation to participate in particular types of classes	Students are required to attend all classes included in the study timetable. Participation in practical classes within subjects covering individual and team-based forms of physical activity that require an above-average level of physical fitness is conditional, for students enrolled in the BA and MA programmes in Physical and Health Education, upon submitting a valid medical certificate to the Dean's Office of the Faculty of Educational Sciences. Students should apply for this medical certificate at the healthcare facilities specified in the referral issued by the Dean of the Faculty of Educational Sciences. Failure to submit a valid medical certificate will result in the student not being permitted to participate in the above-mentioned classes delivered in accordance with the curriculum for the relevant semester of study.
§ 5(1)(c)	Scope and conditions of conducting classes, knowledge or skills tests and diploma examinations in a foreign language and preparing diploma theses in a foreign language	none
§ 5(1)(d)	The assessment period for full-time and part-time BA and MA studies, as well as long-term MA studies, organised either by semester or by academic year	The credit period is a semester.
§ 5(1)(e)	Admissibility and conditions for repeating the first semester or year of study	No repetition of the first semester of study is allowed. It is permitted to repeat the second semester of study due to documented health reasons or documented unforeseen circumstances.
§ 5(1)(f)	Maximum number of academic hours and maximum number of examinations per academic year	According to the study timetable; the maximum number of academic hours per academic year is 900, the maximum number of examinations is 8.

§ 5(1)(g)	Minimum average grade in the course of study to date allowing for an individual study timetable and programme (IPS)	A grade point average of no less than 4.75.
§ 5(1)(h)	Conditions of admissibility and procedure for resolving a student's appeal against a decision to refuse credit for a course/component classes	It is permissible for a student to appeal against a decision to refuse credit in the event of non-compliance with the conditions set out under § 40 of the Rules. 1. The student has the right to appeal to the Dean within 7 days. In particularly justified cases, the Dean, in consultation with the head of the relevant organisational unit, decides to appoint a committee to test the student's knowledge. The Committee consists of: a) the head of the organisational unit acting as a chairperson of the committee, b) the person teaching the subject in question, c) the second specialist in the subject covered by the assessment. The Committee also includes a representative of the student self-government as an observer. A committee assessment of the student's knowledge may take place despite the absence of the student self-government representative. 2. The committee assessment of the student's knowledge should take place within 10 days of the Dean's decision. 3. The Committee decides on the outcome by a majority of votes and, in the event of a tie, the chairperson has a deciding vote.

§ 5(1)(j)	Scope of requirements for the diploma examination	Degree programmes: Pedagogy (BA and MA studies), Physical and Health Education (MA studies), and Arts Education in Visual Arts and Music (MA studies) – the diploma examination includes an assessment of knowledge acquired in core subjects, specialist knowledge relevant to the degree programme, and knowledge related to the diploma thesis, including a critical evaluation of the undertaken research project and the obtained results.

		Degree programmes: Physical and Health Education (BA studies) and Arts Education in Visual Arts and Music (BA studies) – the diploma examination includes an assessment of knowledge acquired in core subjects, specialist knowledge relevant to the degree programme, and knowledge related to the diploma thesis, including a critical analysis of the educational solutions recommended in the research and educational project. Pre-school and Early School Education – the MA examination includes: assessment of knowledge and the ability to critically evaluate the results of the student's own research, respond to comments contained in the examiners' reports, and discuss the issues addressed in the diploma thesis. Psychology – the MA examination includes: assessment of knowledge related to the topic of the diploma thesis and the ability to critically evaluate the results of the student's own research, respond to comments contained in the examiners' reports, and discuss the issues addressed in the diploma thesis. The diploma examination for each degree programme offered by the Faculty of Educational Sciences shall comprise at least three questions, including a minimum of two questions from the thesis supervisor and one question from the examiner. Students enrolled in the Pre-school and Early School Education programme prepare for the examination on the basis of the prescribed topics. For all other degree programmes offered by the Faculty of Educational Sciences, no fixed list of examination questions is provided.

§ 5(2)(a)	The maximum number of repeated semesters/academic years, including repetitions resulting from resumption, on degree programmes offered by the Faculty; and the maximum period that may elapse following removal from the	During the course of study, a student may repeat each semester once, starting from the second semester of study. It is permitted to resume studies once, starting from the second year of study. It is permissible to resume studies in the period up to 5 academic years from the date of removal from the student's register.

§ 5(2)(b)	Minimum number of ECTS credits or minimum number of courses allowing a student to pass a semester/year conditionally and to be enrolled in the next semester/year of study	The minimum requirements for conditional completion of a semester and enrolment on the subsequent semester of studies are: - obtaining no more than 5 ECTS credits fewer than the number required under the study plan for the given semester or failing no more than one subject.

§ 5(2)(d)	Mandatory subjects without passing of which a student may not be enrolled in the next semester/year of study, regardless of the score	none

§ 5(2)(e)	Rules for the transfer of students from full-time to part-time studies or from part-time to full-time studies other than those set out in § 23 of these Rules; rules applicable to the whole faculty or to individual majors	Rules for transferring students from part-time to full-time studies: - grade point average of 4.9 and participation in national or international research projects, - scholarships from the Minister competent for Higher Education and participation in national or international research projects. Transfer of students from full-time to part-time studies is possible without any additional requirements.
§ 5(2)(e¹)	Rules for transferring students from other higher education institutions other than those set out in § 25 of the Rules of Study	Transfer to a degree programme is possible provided that the student meets the admission requirements relating to the number of points required for the relevant academic year.

§ 5(2)(g)	Possibility to apply from the first semester in the MA programme for an individual study timetable and programme (IPS)	An individual study plan and programme (IPS) may be granted to graduates of BA studies who obtained a very good grade on their degree diploma and achieved an average grade of at least 4.5 throughout their BA studies.
§ 5(2)(h)	Rules for the completion of a course of study other than those set out in § 38(7) and (8)	A student may receive credit towards the continuation of their studies for a maximum of two subjects from subsequent years of study.
§ 5(2)(i)	Rules for obtaining credit and taking examinations other than those set out in § 38(9) of these Rules	none
§ 5(2)(j)	Additional designations or examples of written work fulfilling the requirements of the thesis, in addition to those indicated in § 52	none
